## Staff trained on gender sensitivity



The training was conducted virtually, combining Zoom sessions with Google classroom modules, due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

ddressing gender and development or GAD issues is at the center of DA-PhilRice's policy in maintaining gender equality

to achieve inclusive and sustainable development in rice, and the agriculture sector in general.

On Aug.16 to Sep. 3, the blended Gender Sensitivity Training (GST) was held by the institute to teach its staff and help them understand the sensitivity of issues on sex and gender, gender gap, division of labor, manifestations of gender bias, and other GAD-related concepts especially in the agriculture sector where it operates.

The first batch of trainees was composed of 83 participants from the Administrative, Research, and Development sectors - 58 women and 25 men staff.

Twenty-nine (29) of them graduated with distinction, while 12 received special GADtimpala awards.

A variety of module assessments, exercises, and games to make learning more interactive was utilized.

"I became more aware of the gender mainstreaming efforts in government institutions, the situation of women in the rice industry, and things I can personally do in my job like being deliberate in using gender-sensitive and inclusive language when writing," GST graduate Mervalyn O. Tomas of the Development Communication Division and an indigenous community member, said. (JA Diamsay)

## **COVID Fund created**



-PhilRice is providing financial assistance to all personnel who incur COVID-related expenses in the performance of their duties under the newly created COVID Fund.

Regular staff and other personnel are required to submit necessary

documents such as official receipts, travel orders, and trip tickets to avail of the financial assistance.

Executive director Dr. John C. de Leon said the institute's assistance to COVID-affected staff "will come through 80% reimbursed expenses for testing only (while) each of the branches has initially received P100,000 for the use of their workers. Reimbursements are retroactive to May 12, 2021 when the Board of Trustees (BOT) approved the Fund."

The fund is allowed under Section 72 of Republic Act 11518 (General Appropriations Act for the Fiscal Year 2021).

A 4-member COVID Fund Screening Committee is in-charge with determining the validity, legality, and limitations of the financial assistance that will be charged to the COVID Fund.

## Farmers to get 1.5M bags RCEF seeds in 2022 DS



ore than 600,000 farmerbeneficiaries are expected to receive free high-quality certified inbred seeds from the RCEF Seed Program this 2022 dry season (DS).

The seed delivery and distribution, which started on Sept.16, aims to deliver 1.5 million bags of seeds to 723 municipalities in 42 provinces until March 2022.

The farmers can also avail of technical briefings, Farmer Field Schools, seminars/field days, knowledge sharing, information, education and communication support materials, and other learning events under the RCEF Extension Program.

Meanwhile, extension workers will receive free trainings and short courses through the Rice Specialists Training and Training of Trainers.

## In-house occupational and safety management system improved



Fire and electrical safety awareness is key in fire prevention and in performing maintenance and repairs of electrical equipment by qualified personnel. On Aug. 27, 30 workers from different divisions at our Central Experiment Station (CES) participated in the Basic Electrical Safety Awareness webinar to help improve the institute's Occupational Health and Safety Management System. The Integrated Management Standards and Services Office led the training with Markrinello M. Sarical of the Health & Safety Solutions as the resource speaker.

On COVID-19 response, the institute capacitated 70 contact tracer attendees from all offices and divisions of CES, branch stations, and satellite offices on proper contact tracing knowledge and skills through the Contact Tracer Awareness Training held on Oct. 11. Catholic priest Arnold Abelardo, Nueva Ecija Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF) spokesperson, facilitated the training.







## High-yielding varieties, management technologies introduced to Laguna farmers



wenty farmers were briefed about high-yielding rice varieties and pest and nutrient management technologies in a techno-orientation conducted by Los Baños station at the DA-Agricultural Training Institute (DA-ATI)-assisted farm school in Pila, Laguna on Oct. 14.

Showcased at the Roqueza Integrated Farm school owned by Evita Roqueza, were public hybrid (M1), NSIC Rc 216, a popular inbred in the locality, and the newly released varieties Rc 508, Rc 510, and Rc 514.

Meanwhile, about 100 farmers in the Farmer Field School had undergone hands-on training on nutrient decision support tools such as Minus-One Element Technique and Leaf Color Chart.

These activities were conducted in collaboration with DA-ATI IV-A, DTI-TESDA Laguna, and the local government unit of Pila to create awareness and encourage farmers to adopt and plant the newly released high-yielding varieties introduced to them.

## Manufacturing, commercialization agreements inked

DA-PhilRice is eyeing more modern, non-exclusive technology licensing agreements following the signing of two agreements allowing the Guimba, Nueva Ecijabased ACT Machineries and Metal Craft Corporation to manufacture and commercialize institutedeveloped farm machines.

These machines are the Multipurpose Seeder that distributes seeds uniformly and the Ride-on Buoyant Tiller capable of tilling soft, shallow, to relatively deep-mud fields.

Executive director Dr. John C. de Leon said the agreements are "gateway to bring these machines to farmers, the winners in this event." Meanwhile, Dr. Eduardo Jimmy P. Quilang, deputy ED for research, challenged ACT to raise the commercialization level of its production. Likewise, Dr. Karen Eloisa T. Barroga, deputy ED for development, underscored the importance of our technologies being licensed to manufacturers for distribution to intended users.

De Leon and ACT representatives Marites M. Saldo and Sherman B. Valdez signed the agreements on Sept. 21. (JRA Buenaventura)

## Agusan marks 31st anniversary



During the Agusan branch station's 31st anniversary on Aug 9, Director Dr. Caesar Joventino Tado stated that the station will focus on macro and micronutrient deficiencies and toxicities research to achieve 4t/ha in Caraga Region by 2022.

Tado also lauded the branch's entire workforce for supporting the RCEF team in the seed distribution, extension, and communication efforts this year. He thanked the pioneering staff for their continued service.

## Olympic gold medalist Hidilyn Diaz honored



DA-PhilRice honored Olympic gold medalist weightlifter-airwoman Hidilyn Diaz, a farmer's daughter and empowered woman, through the institute's rice paddy art. The paddy art can be viewed at the 5-ha FutureRice Farm in Nueva Ecija. Diaz won the Philippines' first Olympic gold medal at the 2020 Summer Olympics in the women's 55kg category for

weightlifting, and set a new world record. Paddy art uses a technique called "anamorphosis" where an image only becomes visible when viewed in a special manner.

## RiceBIS coops set multi-purpose upgrade



he Esperanza RiceBIS Producers Cooperative (ESRIPCO) in Agusan del Norte is targeting a multi-purpose upgrade within the next two years following its operation since RiceBIS Agusan organized it during its 2019 RiceBIS Phase 1. ESRIPCO currently provides high-quality seeds and farm inputs in the province.

Meanwhile, 50 farmer-members of the Gumaga Farmers Association in Libungan, North Cotabato can now reduce their production cost including milling rice products after receiving farm machines from the RCEF Mechanization Program. The machines included 1 unit combine harvester, 4-wheel-drive tractor, and rice transplanter, among others.

"The convergence of government extension services in Gumaga will boost the application of rice production technologies we teach rice farmers. The knowledge gained and machines acquired will help enhance their rice farming practices, productivity, and profitability," Midsayap branch RiceBIS Project Leader Pernelyn S. Torrena said.

Dr. Torrena added that farm mechanization is one of the crop management practices under the PalayCheck System. The Midsayap RiceBIS team continues to guide and strengthen Gumaga farmers in their agroenterprise activities and in opportunities in accessing government projects. (WJM Lorenzo and STC Quiring)





## Forum, techno-demo, training focus on hybrid



n Sep.1, the Regional Rice Technology Forum and Hybrid Rice Techno-Demo Harvest Festival highlighted the vigor of 14 hybrids under the agro-climatic conditions in Region 12's Cotabato and Sultan Kudarat provinces.

The 14 hybrid rice varieties featured during the event at the Midsayap station were PHB 79, Bigante, Habilis, SL-8H, SL-12H, SL-19H, Hyvar, US88, TH 82, Batari, Longping 534 and 2096, Mestiso 20, and Kimbee.

Farmers from Buenavista, Quezon also showcased the public hybrid Mestiso 20 during the Farmer's Field Day last Oct. 15. The hybrid rice were produced by the farmers during the seed production trial last DS2020.

Unlike inbred rice varieties, hybrids have longer and thicker root system, bigger and heavier panicles, faster growth rate, and higher vigor that allow them to produce higher yields.

During another event, 36 accredited rice seed growers from Cagayan

also learned how to sample R-line (male palay) and A-line (female palay) to understand the state of panicle development and flowering stage of both mature parental lines. These lines are parents of F1 hybrid seeds like Mestizo 1.

Meanwhile, the Season-Long Training on F1 Hybrid Rice Commercialization officially started in Barangay Bacsay, Luna, Apayao with 30 inbred and hybrid rice farmers in attendance on September 21.

The training focuses on producing commercial Mestizo 1 and Mestiso 20 varieties with emphasis on land preparation, pest infestation, water and nutrient management, and harvesting.

Isabela station leads the training in cooperation with municipal and city agriculture offices, and local government officials in implementing Rice Development Initiatives for Cagayan Valley and CAR Environments.

## **NOVEMBER** is National Rice Awareness Month



e RICEponsibly healthy. The public is encouraged to consume healthier rice produced by Filipino farmers in the month-long celebration of the National Rice Awareness Month (NRAM) this November.

The celebration, which kicks off on Nov. 8, highlights the importance of pigmented and brown rice with the theme "Be RICEponsibly healthy." Golden Rice is also being introduced.

Food scientist Dr. Marissa V. Romero of DA-PhilRice stressed that the health benefits of rice depend on its type.

"White or milled or polished rice is a good source of carbohydrates that provide the energy needed in our daily functions. It also contains 6-10% protein. Unfortunately, this kind of rice has a relatively high glycemic index (GI), which indicates a faster conversion of carbohydrates to sugars, particularly glucose," she explained.

Romero recommends the consumption of brown or unpolished rice as it has more fiber, minerals, and vitamins, particularly B vitamins. Brown rice also has a lower GI than white rice.

"This type of rice is rich in nutrients because its bran is kept intact. Thus, its consumption could help prevent obesity and the onset of lifestyle diseases, as shown by some clinical studies," she said.

Meanwhile, pigmented rice such as black or red rice contain phytochemicals in the bran.

"These phytochemicals have high antioxidant activity that strengthens our bodies against chronic lifestyle diseases. They scavenge free radicals, which usually destroy body cells and cause health complications such as poor eyesight, diabetes, atherosclerosis (blood flow restriction due to fat buildup), and cancer," she added.

Romero also mentioned Golden Rice, a type of rice with beta-carotene, which can be converted into vitamin A as needed by the body. Studies show that a cup of cooked Golden Rice can provide 30-50% estimated average requirement of vitamin A for pre-school children and two cups for school children and adults.

Consumers are also urged to patronize rice produced by Filipino farmers as based on a comparative study, the country's rice is generally less exposed to pesticides than imported rice.

Activities will include healthy rice exhibits, media engagement, and social media activities like posting of rice trivias, promotion of healthy rice, patronage of local rice, and not wasting the staple food.

In addition, the public is reminded to avoid wastage to help achieve rice security. The 2018 Household Food Consumption Survey of the Food and Nutrition Research Institute showed that a household wastes 72% or 66.8g of cereal products and cereals including rice in a plate.

## R4D Conference tackles game-changing agenda



-PhilRice will convene the rice sector to discuss the new challenges and opportunities in rice research for

development in the 33rd Ugnay Palay: National Rice R4D e-conference, Nov. 4-5

Dr. John C. de Leon, executive director, said that the conference focused on the agriculture sector adapting strategies that emphasize food security amidst the pandemic.

"The pandemic is pushing us to think and act more. This is the time when availability, accessibility, and affordability of nutritious food need not be compromised while dealing with the farm productivity constraints. The Mandanas-Garcia ruling and

the province-led agriculture and fishery extension system may provide opportunities for us to improve the agriculture sector," he said.

Researchers, scientists, academics, students, farmers, and other stakeholders will help identify ways that can assist the local government units in implementing the new programs.

One DA Reform Agenda, national agricultural programs, and the Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund Programs will also be highlighted in the plenary sessions. (CLB Gado-Gonzales) /
