Sec. Laurel counts on science to improve rice industry

Francisco Tiu Laurel Jr. has
underscored the need
for a science-based approach to
enhance local food security and
lessen reliance on imports during
the Ugnay Palay: 35th National Rice
R4DE Conference in Nueva Ecija,
Nov. 29.

In his keynote address, the freshly confirmed cabinet member said, "Our ultimate goal is to swiftly reduce rice imports for food security and efficiency. We also aim to inspire a new generation of farmers, researchers, and innovators to ensure long-term food security for a prosperous Philippines. Together, let us fulfill our shared dream of a strong, prosperous, and food-secure country."

President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. conveyed his support through a message read by Laurel. The chief executive expressed optimism with the growing support from government agencies, private

partners, and stakeholders to energize and fortify the rice industry as envisioned by his administration's goal of a food-secure nation.

"I enjoin all of you to continue working better to ensure that the benefits of our initiatives reach every farmer in our country. As we do this, let us be guided by the science-based strategies presented in the PhilRice Strategic Plan 2023-2028, emphasizing the necessity to educate farmers on modern technologies for integration into their daily work," Marcos said.

On the same occasion, the Bank of the Philippine Islands (BPI) Foundation granted the farmers under the Rice Business Innovations System (RiceBIS) Program in San Carlos, Negros Occidental with P5.2 million to help them increase their income.

With the presence of Agriculture Secretary Tiu Laurel Jr., Executive Director John de Leon, Deputy Executive Director for Development Karen Eloisa Barroga, and program lead Diadem Gonzales-Esmero received the symbolic check from BPI officials, including trustee Mary Catherine Elizabeth Santamaria and project manager Melanie Magbuhos.

In the opening program,
Undersecretary Leocadio Sebastian
discussed the MASAGANA Rice
Industry Development Program
and outlined the government's
plan for the rice industry, which
includes a whole value chain
approach to ensure a steady supply
of affordable rice for consumers,
increasing income for rice farming
communities, and nutritional
security.

The conference focused on various strategies to improve agricultural practices. PhilRice Executive Director John de Leon highlighted the MAtatag strategy, which aims to optimize yield, increase resilience, reduce risks, and maintain ecological integrity. Deputy Director Karen Eloisa Barroga explained the SAma-sama strategy, which enhances bargaining power, market access, and economies of scale. Dr. Aurora Corales discussed the GAnado strategy, which aims to increase farmer engagement, value addition, and market linkage. Dr. Eduardo Jimmy Quilang outlined the NApapanahon strategy, which improves access to data and services, reduces transaction costs, and ensures efficient service delivery.

The Nov. 29-Dec. 1 Ugnay Palay had five plenary sessions with four concurrent sessions that presented 30 research papers centered on the MASAGANA thematic areas and 63 posters on relevant technologies and practices. Close to 600 in-person participants from PhilRice Central Experiment Station (CES), branch stations, and partner agencies joined the national conference.

Lawmakers support "Be RICEponsible" campaign

everal legislators expressed their support for the National Rice Awareness Month (NRAM) BeRICEponsible campaign as they visited the recent exhibit titled, "Palay. Bigas. Kanin. Alamin" at the Senate building in Pasay City.

The lawmakers affirmed their commitment to the campaign by endorsing the ABKD practices: (A) Adlay, mais, saba, atbp. ay ihalo sa kanin; (B) Brown Rice ay kainin; (K) Kanin ay huwag sayangin; at (D) Dapat bigas ng Pilipinas ang bilhin by signing the BeRICEponsible pledge wall.

The exhibit, co-hosted by PhilRice and the office of Senator Loren Legarda, was attended by Senators Pia and Alan Peter Cayetano, Cynthia Villar, Raffy Tulfo, Bong Go, and JV Ejercito. Representatives Mark Cojuangco, Wilbert Lee, and Joey Salceda, and DA undersecretary for Rice Industry Development Leocadio Sebastian also participated in the event.

"We often overlook the significance of everyday things, and we hope that these kinds of exhibits make us look inward at how we consume

and waste a precious commodity," Legarda said.

The exhibit showcased various aspects, including the PhilRice Genebank, rice breeding processes, milling techniques using portable and pedal-type brown rice machines, and the essence of the BeRICEponsible campaign.

Sen. Pia Cayetano, impressed by the pedal-operated brown rice machine, expressed her interest in proposing to distribute it to small rice farm shareholders. This proposal received

support from Legarda, who remarked, "Donating these machines to barangays would be truly beneficial, providing them with the means to produce brown rice."

Dr. Hazel Antonio, the lead for NRAM celebrations, supported this initiative. She explained how the machine would be beneficial, stating, "The issue with brown rice is that it tends to become rancid quickly. Allowing local rice shareholders to acquire this machine will assist them in milling brown rice and having it fresh whenever needed."

Agencies affirm help for agripreneurs

ublic agencies in Region II and Cordillera showed unity in assisting farmers become agripreneurs during the regions' launching of RiceBIS 2.0 in Dupax Del Sur, Nueva Vizcaya, Nov. 16.

The event, held concurrently with the mass graduation of four batches of Philippine Good Agricultural Practices (PhilGAP), strengthened the ties among key stakeholders including the Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), Agricultural Training Institute (ATI), and Department of Science and Technology (DOST).

Local government units, the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), and DA-Regional Field Office (DA-RFO) also reaffirmed their commitment to enhancing the income and resources of organized farmers.

Dr. Diadem Gonzales-Esmero, program lead, emphasized the importance of building alliances, stating, "We highly

encourage our partners to strengthen our alliances, because together we can ensure the success of our RiceBIS farmers to become millionaires."

Vincent Gonzales, chairperson of the St. Vincent Parish Multi-Purpose Cooperative, commended the collaborative efforts, declaring, "The DA and its attached agencies tirelessly work together to uplift our farmers. So, I also call them the Department of Love and Passion."

The event also celebrated the graduation of 200 farmers completing the Philippine Good Agricultural Practices (PhilGAP) training.

"We are so grateful for the assistance that PhilRice and other agencies have given us. You are gradually changing and improving our farming activities. We have never thought that farmers can become rich, too," Eva Carpiso of the Marasat-Dagupan RiceBIS Cooperative in San Mateo, Isabela said.

Rice month espouses RICEponsible practices

hilRice heightened its

To "Be RICEponsible," Filipinos are encouraged to follow the "ABKD": A - Adlay, mais, saba, atbp. ay ihalo sa kanin (Mix rice with other food staples), B - Brown rice ay kainin (Eat brown rice or unpolished rice), K - Kanin ay huwag sayangin (Eat what we can consume), D - Dapat bigas ng Pilipinas ang bilhin (Patronize locally-produced rice).

These were disseminated through online contests such as Pinasarap na Kanin, Brown Rice Challenge, Iwas Aksaya, and "Be Riceponsible" Buyer Challenge. Teresa de Leon, won the Pinasarap na Kanin cooking contest; Deodolino Quito, Iwas Aksaya video contest; and April Rose Melicado, Brown Rice Challenge.

As the country observes the National Rice Awareness Month, the Department of Agriculture is encouraging consumers to avoid rice wastage and to buy locally produced rice to help the farmers boost their income.

Dr. Karen Eloisa Barroga, Deputy Executive Director for Development, said in a Palace press briefing that under the DA's "Be RICEponsible" campaign, the agency is involving the consumers in preventing rice wastage which is around P7 million a year, aiding local farmers and providing the public with healthy food choices.

Some members of the country's lower house of congress are also backing the call for half-cup rice servings, supporting a bill that was first submitted in the Senate in 2013 by then Sen. Ferdinand Marcos Jr.

Antonio clarified that the half-cup rice servings are not intended as a mandatory measure, but aim to provide an option that aligns with the individual preference of consuming less rice.

In addition to the Be RICEponsible and agri-career campaigns, and Farmers' Market, PhilRice Los Baños hosted its 21st Ceremonial Rice Harvesting as NRAM key event, in which 200 Salawag National High School students experienced planting and harvesting rice for the first time. Kiwanis International Philippine Luzon District cosponsored the activity.

Meanwhile, 240 indigenous people students from Puting Bato, Cabadbaran City benefited from the feeding program organized by PhilRice Agusan at Lusong Elementary School, Nov. 17. PhilRice Negros also fed 150 students of La Castellana National High School, Nov. 14.

About 300 pupils of Agriculture Central Elementary School in Midsayap were treated with a popular snack mixed with rice, sweet potato, saba, and corn, Nov. 21.

PhilRice Bicol staged a "Palay Lakad" in Ligao City, Albay to raise awareness and encourage the citizens to join in the advocacy. Ligao National High School students, Ligao City Women's Club members, and senior citizens were also introduced to nutritious rice.

PhilRice Isabela featured Ramon's Rice Art Nation that has won several regional and national awards while PhilRice Batac and DA-Regional Field Office I distributed 1kg of Malusog Rice to 200 tricycle drivers in La Union.

These recommendations were derived from a thorough soil analysis conducted by PhilRice using the Minus-One-Element Technique (MOET) kit and app.

The app facilitates farmers in obtaining answers to queries regarding the appropriate fertilizer type and optimal application timing. Implementing MOET-based recommendations is expected to enhance fertilizer optimization and consequently contribute to achieving satisfactory yields.

Korean official shares tips on managing rice salinity

r. Kyu Seong Lee, director of the Korea Program for International Cooperation in Agricultural Technology (KOPIA) Philippine Center and vice administrator of Rural Development Administration (RDA) in Korea, has encouraged local government units and the academe in Bicol to increase productivity in saline-prone agricultural areas.

In the seminar titled, "Salinity Tolerance in rice: Exploring mechanisms and advancing

productivity through effective management strategies," Lee shared the practices implemented by South Korea to reduce salt levels in rice fields.

Among these practices include integrated nutrient management or the application of proper levels of nitrogen and phosphorus and the optimal split application of nitrogen: leaching or removing excess salt through irrigation during rice growth; and use of salt-tolerant rice varieties.

PhilRice joins nationwide movement to end violence against women

hilRice has kicked off the national advocacy of the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW) dubbed as the 18-day Campaign to End Violence Against Women (VAW) with the theme "United for a VAW-free Philippines."

The national advocacy seeks to heighten public awareness and garner support for multi-stakeholder efforts aimed at eradicating Violence Against Women (VAW).

The 2022 Philippine National Demographic Health Survey released by the Philippine Statistics Authority showed that 18 percent of women aged 15-49 years have experienced forms of physical, sexual, emotional, economic, or psychological violence.

Despite the Philippines ranking-16th globally in gender equality, according to the 2023 Global Gender Gap Index Report by the World Economic Forum, the PCW and other stakeholders recognize ongoing issues of violence and abuse in the country.

Sophia Borja, OIC deputy executive director for Administrative Services and Finance and chair of the Committee on Decorum and Investigation of Sexual Harassment Cases is calling for more advocates, influencers, and champions among the agriculture sectors, and the general public to raise awareness about VAW and how they can support in ending this pervasive social problem.

Likewise, similar activities were simultaneously conducted in the branch stations. Other initiatives included conducting offline and online seminars on VAW-related laws and GAD-related training, wearing of

advocacy shirts, and implementing social media advocacy campaigns.

The advocacy is backed by Proclamation No. 1172 and RA 10398, which mark Nov. 25-Dec. 12 as an 18-day campaign aimed at ending violence against women and children. This aligns with the National Consciousness Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC).

Rice education for youth strengthened

o help alleviate the potential ill effects of the aging of farmers, PhilRice and two Kiwanis clubs are intensifying efforts to revitalize agriculture through youth education.

Citing reports from the Southeast Asian Regional Center for Graduate Study and Research in Agriculture, Glenda Hufano, governor of Kiwanis International-Philippine Luzon District, said that with Filipino farmers now aged between 55 and 59 years old, experts have forecasted that the country will face a critical decline of farmers in 10-12 years.

"The project we are collaborating on aims to educate children not only about rice S&T but also to raise them to be progressive, entrepreneurial food producers," Hufano said during the signing of a memorandum of agreement in Nueva Ecija, Nov. 7.

The agreement provides that the Kiwanis Club of Pasay and Rice Granary Science City of Muñoz will collaboratively establish and maintain a campsite at the PhilRice FutureRice Farm.

"This campsite, to be called The sParK, will offer an engaging, educational alternative to malls and digital entertainment," Hufano said.

Campers will see high-yielding rice varieties and experience farm automation and diversified farming.

The Kiwanis also co-sponsored the recent annual ceremonial harvesting
