GAD efforts mainstreamed

he Institute celebrated 2025 National Women's Month in March with a series of Gender and Development (GAD) initiatives in its headquarters and branch stations. The month-long celebration themed "Babae sa Lahat ng Sektor, Aangat ang Bukas sa Bagong Pilipinas" aimed to promote Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI), in line with the Magna Carta of Women.

The series of events strengthened GAD integration in agriculture and

development programs by capacitating women and vulnerable sectors through GAD orientation and gender sensitization with farmers, financial literacy sessions, machinery operation training, webinars, livelihood support, and series of GAD coaching with the program leaders to ensure genderresponsiveness of program/project implementation. These efforts built confidence among empowered women farmers, enhanced workplace gender sensitivity, and fostered stronger partnerships among local stakeholders. Branch stations also hosted unique and fun activities, such as "GAD Talks", Zumba sessions, wellness services, contests, and appreciation ceremonies for women staffers.

A key highlight of the celebration was the roundtable discussion at PhilRice CES on Mar. 19, where staffers and partners evaluated ongoing GAD mainstreaming efforts and proposed policy improvements to support the transition toward a more inclusive GESI.

DA chief stresses seeds' importance

Agriculture Secretary Francisco P. Tiu Laurel Jr. underscored the critical role of seeds as the foundation of food security and key to farmers' success to more than 700 farmers, extension workers, partners, and high school students during the *Lakbay Palay*. Funded by the Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund (RCEF) Program, the Lakbay Palay was themed "*Binhi* ang Susi" emphasizing the vital role of quality seeds in rice production, conducted at its headquarters on Mar. 27.

Manager of Eastern Sto. Domingo Agriculture Cooperative Raflornito L. Blas and President of Casongsong Farmers Association Virginia Dela Cruz Rihad shared that PhilRice guided them on the use of high-quality seeds and that the RCEF Seeds and Extension Programs have transformed their community's farming practices. Farmers from La Union, Pangasinan, Isabela, Zambales, Tarlac, and Nueva Ecija participated in the event.

Meanwhile, nearly a thousand farmers, students, and agri-professionals gathered at PhilRice Negros on Apr. 2-3 for their 2025 Dry Season *Lakbay Palay*. PhilRice Bicol did the same in Borongan City, Eastern Samar on Mar. 21, and in Castilla, Sorsogon on Mar. 24 to draw attention to climate-resilient rice varieties from the *Binhing Palay* farms. It aimed to foster teamwork among stakeholders for improved seed support outcomes.

To recognize their outstanding efforts and contributions during the past season, the Isabela Seed Growers Multi-Purpose Cooperative received the Best Seed Growers' Cooperative award.
